Residuary gift

This is a share of or sometimes all your estate. After you've made provision for your loved ones, you can leave a share of what remains to charity. This is known as a 'residuary' gift.

Residuary legacy

- I GIVE all (or ... share) of my Residuary Estate to St Margaret's Church (Registered Charity Number 1139738) care of Parish Office, Church Lane, Chipstead CR5 3RD to be applied for its general purposes
- 1.2 AND I DIRECT that
- (a) the receipt of the person who professes to be the treasurer or other proper office for the time being of the above mentioned charity shall be a complete discharge to my Executors
- (b) if before my death the above mentioned charity has changed its name or amalgamated with or transferred all its assets to any other body then my Executors shall give effect to the gift as if it has been made to the body in its changed name or to the body which results from the amalgamation or to which the transfer has been made.

Pecuniary gift

A cash gift. This is for when you would like to leave an exact sum of money to charity.

Pecuniary legacy

Specific gift

A particular item, such as property, antiques, jewellery and shares. This is known as a 'specific' gift.
